### Bringing up baby

#### Did you know ...?

It's estimated that the cost of raising a child has risen by a third over the last five years to almost £194,000.

Parents spend an average of £9,200 a year - roughly £770 each month - on their children.

By 2012, the cost of raising a child in the UK could reach over £265,000, equivalent to more than £12,500 every year.

(Figures taken from Investment group LV Cost of Child Survey 2008.)

Child Trust Fund (CTF) is a savings and investment account for children. Children receive a £250 voucher to start their account. The account belongs to the child and can't be touched until they turn 18, so that children have some money behind them to start their adult life.
