The messages of the SunSmart campaign, run by Cancer Research UK and supported by the Department of Health, are:

- Stay in the shade 11 a.m. 3 p.m.
- Make sure you never burn
- Always cover up with a t-shirt, wide brimmed hat and sunglasses
- Remember to take extra care with children
- Then use factor 15+ sunscreen

The Lemonade Stand game


A game for children – but others might enjoy it too!
