The aim of the Citizenship programme at City College Norwich is to develop in our students a skills set and knowledge base in order to enable them to participate in college life, to contribute to our very active Student Union and to enact change where needed. Students at City College are involved in all levels of the decision making process through the structure of Course Representation and the Student Parliament. Students also sit on the Board of Governors, the Finance committee, Health and Safety committee and the Inclusive Learning Committee.

Citizenship is also incorporated in to the wider Enrichment Programme. Student-lead focus groups are used to identify students' needs and from this a range of opportunities is offered. This includes the M8 'mate' peer mentoring scheme, the Duke of Edinburgh's Award, debating society, fundraising for charity, events weeks and guest lectures.



During 2005 - 2006 the Enrichment Programme at City College is supporting the Dedza district in Malawi. There are three main areas of focus for fundraising;

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PADEAP: African Solutions to African Problems.

A talk for students on Wednesday 5th October in D17.

Too often the media focus is on the aid that Africa receives, needs, misuses. Too often we receive a picture of a continent that is weak and dependent, that needs the superior skills and resources of Western societies to understand and tackle its difficulties. If there are positive images these still tend to concentrate on music, dance or sport. All of this is essentially an updated version of the uncivilised, undeveloped world of racist mythology.

Christine Tominke Olaniyan from the Pan African Development, Education and Advocacy Programme (PADEAP) offers a very different insight into Africa. She talks about PADEAP's work with community organisations, in East and West Africa, that is designed to ensure that control of African problems and solutions is placed in the hands of the real experts - African people. Christine will follow her talk by a question and answer session.

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
