CITIZENSHIP AT AYLESBURY HIGH SCHOOL

Welcome to Citizenship at Aylesbury High School!

You have studied Citizenship as a National Curriculum subject up to Year 11, and you will now be able to continue to develop your knowledge and skills post-16. This booklet is designed to make you aware of all the opportunities which are available to you in the Sixth Form at AHS and in the wider community, which will help you to develop your understanding of Citizenship.

What is Citizenship?

Citizenship aims to equip all young people with the knowledge, understanding and skills to participate effectively in society as informed, critical, socially and morally responsible citizens, convinced they can have influence and make a difference in their communities, locally, nationally and globally.

How will I learn about Citizenship?

Many aspects of Citizenship are taught during the tutorial programme on Tuesday mornings. It is also offered at AS level, and there are many opportunities to engage in the life of the school and the wider community. In Year 13 you will take part in community involvement, and a series of current issues lectures will introduce you to different ways of thinking about society and politics.

Why do I need to learn about Citizenship?

Citizenship will help you to:-

- ✓ gain the self-confidence to live happily in society
- ✓ learn how to become helpfully involved in the life and concerns of your school, neighbourhood and community
- learn about how our democracy works and how you as a citizen can make yourself effective in public life - locally, regionally and nationally

LEARN HOW TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

How will I learn about Citizenship in Years 12 and 13?

We have developed a whole-school approach to Citizenship at Aylesbury High School and the subject is taught in the following ways :-

- through the tutorial programme and PSHE
- across the curriculum, through other subjects and through extracurricular activities
- through assemblies and citizenship events
- through AS Level Citizenship

Citizenship education is much more than learning about how political systems, local government, etc. operate. It is about giving you the knowledge and skills to be able to play a role in democratic processes at different levels, from the local and national to the European and international. It is vital that you play an active part in your own learning so that you can transfer your skills and the confidence this brings to whatever public arena you may enter now and in the future.

Sixth Form students are given numerous opportunities in school to be as active and participating as possible, e.g. in assemblies, house events and competitions, music, art, drama and dance events, sporting events, fund raising and charity events, the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, Young Enterprise and Community Involvement, in the school council and in peer-led education. Your community activities outside school are also recognised and encouraged.
